Improving Our Fitness

Here at Pitcairn Primary, over the last six weeks, primary 4/5/6 have been working hard to improve their fitness.

First, they recorded their initial fitness scores by completing a 'beep test'. The test required the whole class to continuously run between two ends that face each other at 20 metres apart. The score was given for the number of runs completed within a given time frame.

Then, they completed various exercises in their PE class, including shuttle runs, squat jumps and sit ups. They created circuits and worked in pairs doing each exercise for 30 seconds then resting for 30 seconds, repeating this twice a week for the term.

Finally, the beep test was repeated to see if there had been an improvement in their fitness. Most children recorded a slight improvement in their fitness and have decided to repeat the process next term to see if they can increase their fitness further.
